Abstract: this paper analyzes Macrobius' translation of Hesiod (op. 122 f.; 126) in somn. 1.9.7, and focuses on patterns of the Roman theory and practice of vertere; it also identifies Macrobius' debts to Virgil (stylistic ones) and Cicero (theoretical) in the context of the poetics of translation in Late Antiquity.
