Abstract: In the opening section of Lucan's Bellum ciuile book 8 (vv. 1-8) the narration of Pompey's flight through the Vale of Tempe reveals an allusion to the description of the Cretan Labyrinth by Ovid (met. 8.155-68). The analysis of the passage not only allows a better comprehension of Lucan's text and his allusive technique, but it also contributes to a deeper understanding of the complex character of Pompey: the image of the labyrinth underlines his ἀμηχανία and qualifies him in opposition to the stoic sapiens; at the same time it also

announces his moral progression toward uirtus.
